Habits of Grace: An invitation for you, from Presiding Bishop Curry

July 7, 2020

A word to the Church from Presiding Bishop Michael Curry:

As we learn how to adjust our lives given the reality of the coronavirus and the request to do our part to slow its spread by practicing social distancing, I invite you to join me each week to take a moment to cultivate a "habit of grace." The 4th of July weekend has just concluded and a new week has begun, but the titanic struggles of the old world continue. The struggles to face painful truths of our racial past, the struggles to find ways to fashion a new future, the struggles for racial justice and human equality and true human reconciliation. Even in the midst of these struggles, we still face a pandemic that is worldwide. Now the United States itself is gravely threatened and affected by COVID-19. And even in the midst of all of that, we enter a season of electioneering, campaigning, a presidential election that could well be a profoundly polarizing and divisive election for our country.

In this time, I remember the worlds of Howard Thurman, who I often go back to. Dr. Thurman was one of the founders of probably the first interracial and interreligious church in the United States in San Francisco, back in the forties and fifties. He was the author of *Jesus and the Disinherited*. He was one of the people who went and met Mahatma Gandhi in the 1940s, and brought back his teachings of non-violent social change that influenced an entire civil rights movement. He was quietly, if you will, the spiritual director of many of the

leaders of the civil rights movement. Whitney Young, Roy Wilkins, Martin King, many others went quietly to Howard Thurman to talk, to reflect, to pray. He wrote this in one of his meditations about times of great transition and turmoil:

Look well to the growing edge. All around us, worlds are dying and new worlds are being born. All around us, life is dying and life is being born. The fruit ripens on the tree, the roots are silently at work in the darkness of the earth against a time when there shall be new leaves, fresh blossoms, green fruit. Such is the growing edge. It is the extra breath from the exhausted lung, the one more thing to try when all else has failed. The upward reach of life when weariness closes in upon all endeavor. This is the basis of hope in moments of despair, the incentive to carry on when times are out of joint and men have lost their reason. A source of confidence when worlds crash and dreams whiten into ash. The birth of a child – life's most dramatic answer to death – this is the growing edge incarnate. Look well to the growing edge!

God love you. God bless you. And may God hold us all in those mighty hands of love.

My husband, Thad, many years ago told this story to describe following God's path in trying circumstances:

"When I was a little boy growing up on Edisto, there was a path in the woods. My older siblings had traveled it many times to visit my mother's best friend, but because I was so much younger than my siblings, I had only heard about walking the path, which was known as going 'across the sands.' One day, my brother decided it was time for me to see this path. We set out from our home, crossed the road, entered the woods, walked over the marsh, and went through another patch of woods. All throughout our journey, we made markings to guide us back home. But when we returned to the marshy areas, we discovered that the tide had come in—and washed away the markings. Despite our careful planning and preparations, we were lost. It was a miracle we found our way home that night. My road map was gone—washed away. But as Christians, we are never truly lost. I relied on the power of prayer, allowed God to direct me, and found my way home."

As we continue down this path together across the sands, I am thankful to our church leadership for their wisdom, skill, and foresight in keeping us safe and connected, and for continuing to help our community. And I look forward to worshipping together again.

From the Junior Warden

Our church will be jointly using with our neighbor, New First Missionary Baptist Church, a device that dispenses a botanical disinfectant solution throughout the sanctuary.

It is a liquid product used in conjunction with a handheld dispenser that puts a positive charge on the liquid product. The device dispenses a fine spray that attaches to negatively charged items throughout the sanctuary. This product is highly recommended as a COVID-19 disinfectant.

Each week, preceding the videoing of the coming Sunday's service, we plan to spray the entire sanctuary. The first spraying was done today, June

7, 2020. When we re-open for Sunday services, spraying will be done, likely on the Friday or Saturday preceding the Sunday service.

The process of spraying takes less than 10 minutes to cover the sanctuary, and is directed within 2 feet of all tables, chairs and pews. We will not have to remove hymnals or prayer books from the pews. It does not require any follow-up wiping and has very little odor. The overall area sprayed can be occupied within 2 hours of the application.

Henry Jenkins, a member of the New First Missionary Baptist Church, and the person who provides cleaning services for our church, will be administering the spray in conjunction with Bob King and George Hayworth.




ways to provide food for the hungry, particularly now that the Allen AME food bank is on hiatus.

"Behind the Scenes" at The Episcopal Church on Edisto

Each week, a small team of dedicated people arrives at our church to create our virtual service. The team includes John Nickerson and Taylor Skardon, our "producers," as well as Fr. Fred, Jim Gettys as Verger and our acolyte. Bella has completed her visit to Edisto—we thank her for serving as an acolyte this summer! Stephen will continue to serve as acolyte for our virtual services. Ginny King and her team of flower arrangers provide our beautiful floral arrangements. Our Lay Intercessors come to read the Prayers of the People and share

our prayer lists. Epistlers come to read the scriptures. The worship team is also the "congregation," providing the verbal responses in the service.

For those behind the scenes, church usually comes on Wednesday, which is the day the virtual service is recorded. John and Taylor each use their smartphones to record the elements of the service, including the readers, the sermon, the Eucharist, and the processionals. The two phones provide two camera angles, recorded synchronously.

John uses video editing software to take the raw footage from both cameras and create a rough draft of the video service. He sends this electronically to Taylor, who uses the same software to add in the instrumental music, the hymns, and the anthem video. He also adds the other graphic elements and short video clips, such as passing of the peace.

We would love to see you in our virtual service passing the peace, reading or in other ways! Smartphones can make terrific recordings. Use landscape mode, and don't worry about editing the beginning or ending of your video. Don't be shy! We are craving the sight of others in the church. Your video—no matter how messy your hair is—is a blessing to us. If you would like to participate, contact Taylor or John.

One the video is edited, the entire service must then be converted to a format that viewers can access, such as a YouTube video. The service is uploaded to YouTube and Facebook with private settings and made public automatically at a scheduled time, usually early Sunday morning.

Recording, editing, converting, and uploading our video service takes considerable time. We are truly blessed to have a production team that has the skills and the commitment to creating this way for us to remain connected as an active congregation.


