1. Babies and Children Products

<p>General requirements</p>	<p>Cot bumpers and baby sleepers claiming to prevent or reduce the chance of SIDS (“Sudden Infant Death Syndrome)” are globally prohibited on eBay.</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none">• Lullabytrust: parents should remove cot bumpers• Rospa: baby sleep positioners• FDA Sleep Positioners and Risk of Suffocation
<p>Specific requirements for the US</p>	<p>If you are listing any product related to toddlers, please make sure that they meet the specific mandatory standards.</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none">• CPSC Durable Infant or Toddler Products
<p>Specific requirements for the EU/UK</p>	<p>EU: If you are listing products like baby walkers, bunk beds, child sleepwear or other products related to children, please make sure that they meet the specific mandatory standards.</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none">• Chilfsafetyeurope: Product Safety Guide pdf <p>UK: Baby products Standards</p>

2. Toys

General requirements	<p>Toys reported unsafe by the authorities (RAPEX, ACCC, OECD, ...) are globally prohibited on eBay. Toys containing DEHP in children’s plastic products are permanently banned worldwide. <u>Examples of recalled products:</u></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none">• Squeezos Tuf-Tuf Tusks Rapex alert• Masha and the bear Rapex alert• Star Wars Executioner Trooper costume Rapex alert <p>Please also note that water expanding balls/ water beads are extremely dangerous for kids and are globally prohibited in the “Toy” category and must not be marketed as toys for children. ACCC Dangers of Water Expanding Balls</p>
Specific requirements for the US	<p>Toys must comply with ASTM F963 – Standard Consumer Safety Specification for Toy Safety. Toy Association Safety Standards</p>
Specific requirements for the EU/UK	<p><u>EU:</u> Toys must comply with the EU Toy Safety Directive.</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none">• EC Europa Toys Safety• EC Europa Placing on the EU market <p><u>UK:</u> Toys must comply with the Toy (Safety) Regulations 2011:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none">• UK Toy Safety Guidance
Specific requirements for AU	<p>Toys containing beads, yo-yo water balls, small high-powered magnets and DEHP in children’s plastic products are permanently banned in Australia. Toys must be properly labelled and comply with the mandatory safety standards.</p> <p>Guide on mandatory safety standards for toys in English, Chinese and Vietnamese: Australian Safety Standards</p> <p>Here for more specific information regarding toys for children up to 36 months.</p>

3. Child Car Safety Seats

General requirements	Child seats, made of fabric offer “almost no protection” and are globally prohibited on eBay.
Specific requirements for the US	Child car safety seats must comply with Federal Motor Vehicle Safety Standard (FMVSS) No. 213. <ul style="list-style-type: none">• NHTSA Regulation• eBay Policy
Specific requirements for the EU/UK	A compliant child car seat must: <ul style="list-style-type: none">• conform to the ECE Regulation ECE 44/04 or ECE R44-03 (this is marked on a label on the seat), or• is approved under R129 (also known as i-Size) Please visit this guidance published by the UNECE. eBay’s Product safety policy for the UK
Specific requirements for AU	Child car safety seats must comply with AS/NZS 1754 standards. <ul style="list-style-type: none">• ACCC Child Restraints for motor vehicles• eBay’s Product safety policy for Australia

4. Laser Pointers

General requirements	Laser pointers are extremely dangerous for kids. They cannot be marketed as a toy and are globally prohibited in the "Toys & Hobbies" category.
Specific requirements for the US	Laser pointers with an output power greater than 5 milliwatts (mW) are prohibited in the US. Please visit this guidelines on FDA's website.
Specific requirements for the EU /UK	Laser pointers with output power greater than 1 milliwatts (mW) are prohibited in the EU and the UK. <u>Exception in Switzerland</u> : all laser pointers are illegal except Class 1 laser pointers. <ul style="list-style-type: none">• Laser Pointer Safety EU• eBay's Product safety policy for the UK• eBay's Product safety policy for DE
Specific requirements for AU	Laser pointers with an output greater than 1 milliwatt (mW) are prohibited in AU. <ul style="list-style-type: none">• Laser Pointer Safety AU• eBay's Product safety policy for AU

5. Health Products

General requirements

Health products are prohibited in the US, in Europe or in Australia if:

- they do not have proper labeling in the local language
- they are not approved by the local authorities
- they make illegal health claims

Many traditional herbal products are on the borderline between medicines and other product categories such as foods or cosmetics. As different legal requirements apply to medicines, foods or cosmetics, it is important that you are clear about the category into which your products fall.

6. Cosmetics

<p>Specific requirements for the US</p>	<p>Cosmetic products are regulated by the Food and Drugs Administration (FDA) through different laws:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none">• Federal Food Drugs and Cosmetic Act (FD&C) of 1938, as amended,• Fair Packaging and Labeling Act. <p>FDA Cosmetics Regulation</p>
<p>Specific requirements for the EU/UK</p>	<p><u>EU</u>: Cosmetics must comply with the EU Regulation No 1223/2009 on cosmetic products : Please see this guidance</p> <p><u>UK</u>: Please see the UK Business Companion Cosmetic products Guide</p>

7. Batteries

General requirements

- Lithium batteries are hazardous products, they must meet all the applicable provisions of the Dangerous Goods Regulations (DGR) when shipped by air.

8. Carbon Monoxide /Smoke Detector Alarms

<p>General requirements</p>	<p>Unsafe CO alarms reported by authorities (RAPEX, ACCC, OECD,...) or by independent bodies (i.e. Which?) are globally prohibited on eBay. There has been a selection of safe brands which are the only ones available on site.</p> <p>Examples of unsafe alarms:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Mudder Carbon Monoxide Alarm Reported • Binwo Carbon Monoxide Alarm Reported • ATZ Saviour Carbon Monoxide Alarm Reported • X-Sense CO03D Reported by Which? • Aico Ei208 Reported by Which? • DETC-01 Rapex Alert • Digoo DG-SA10 Reported by Which?
<p>Specific requirements for the US</p>	<p>Carbon monoxide /smoke alarms must comply with the US standards (UL2034): https://standardscatalog.ul.com/standards/en/standard_2034</p>
<p>Specific requirements for the EU/UK</p>	<p><u>EU</u>: Carbon monoxide /smoke alarms must comply with EU safety standard (EN 50291). Proper tests of the alarm must have been performed and it should last at least 3 months. Sensors, actuators and alarms</p> <p><u>UK</u>: Smoke and Carbon monoxide detectors UK Regulation</p>
<p>Specific requirements for AU</p>	<p>There is no specific standard in Australia that covers the design and manufacture of CO²/smoke alarms for domestic premises. 9. Christmas Lights

<p>General requirements</p>	<p>Recalled Christmas lights are prohibited on eBay. Examples of recalled Christmas lights:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none">• Rapex alert• Rapex alert

<p>Specific requirements for the EU/UK</p>	<p>EU: Christmas lights must comply with the Low Voltage Directive and the relevant European standard EN 60598. Christmas Lights Safety</p> <p>UK: Please find hereafter a guidance for safe UK Christmas lights: UK Christmas Lights Safety</p>
<p>Specific requirements for AU</p>	<p>Christmas lights must have the Regulatory compliance mark: </p> <p>Please also note that sky lanterns are permanently banned in Australia.</p> <p>Christmas Lights Safety Electrical Appliances and Equipment Safety Sky Lanterns Ban-lanterns</p>

10. Condoms

General requirements	Condoms are medical devices and must be sold in a proper packaging. They must be listed on eBay with its box and its instructions. Condoms without a proper box are globally prohibited on eBay.
Specific requirements for the US	Condoms intended for sale or distribution within the US must be conform with FDA regulations. https://www.fda.gov/medical-devices/medical-device-safety
Specific requirements for the EU/UK	Condoms intended for sale or distribution within the European Union must carry the CE/UKCA mark. What is behind the Certification
Specific requirements for AU	Listings of condoms must include the ARTG Licence ID from the Australian Register of Therapeutic Goods . https://www.tga.gov.au/behind-news/regulation-medical-devices

11. Bean bags

General requirements	Bean bags must be properly labelled, must meet the local safety standards and must not have been recalled.
Specific requirements for the US	Recalled bean bags cannot be listed. Example of recalled bean bags: Risk of Entrapment and Suffocation https://www.cpsc.gov/Recalls/2015/ace-bayou-reannounces-recall-of-bean-bag-chairs
Specific requirements for the EU/UK	<p><u>EU</u> : The EU General Product Safety Directive applies to bean bags. All products marketed must be safe to use. Bean bags subject to a RAPEX alert cannot be listed. For more information: Poufs and Bean Bags</p> <p><u>UK</u> : The UK differs to the rest of the EU, please visit the Business Companion Guide</p>
Specific requirements for AU	Bean bags must comply with the mandatory requirements from the Consumer Goods (Bean Bags) Safety Standard 2014. More information: Bean Bags Standards

12. Airbags

<p>General Requirements</p>	<p>Airbag covers are not permitted on any eBay site. These products are not made available for sale by manufacturers.</p> <p><u>Takata Global Recall:</u></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none">• Tens of millions of vehicles with Takata air bags are under recall. Long-term exposure to high heat and humidity can cause these air bags to explode when deployed. Such explosions have caused injuries and deaths.• The airbags, made by major parts supplier Takata, were mostly installed in cars from model year 2002 through 2015. Some of those airbags could deploy explosively, injuring or even killing car occupants.• For more information regarding the Takata recall and the car models affected please visit the Takata recall site
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13. Other Products

<p>Specific requirements for the EU/UK</p>	<p><u>Globally</u>, Adaptors must comply with the mandatory safety standards and not be a part of any recalls such as this one or this one.</p> <p><u>In Germany</u>, please make sure that your products comply with the mandatory safety standards:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none">• Car Parts• LED Light Bulbs <p><u>In the UK</u>: specific requirements for the below products:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none">• Furniture : please see the Business Companion Guide• Electrical equipment :<ul style="list-style-type: none">- Electromagnetic compatibility : Manufacturers, suppliers and installers of electronic and electrical equipment must comply with electromagnetic compatibility regulations. More information- Plugs and Sockets : Electrical products must be supplied correctly and permanently (only removable with a tool) fitted with a fused and approved UK three-pin plug (BS 1363). <p>Specific requirements for AU</p>	<p>Please make sure that your products comply with the mandatory safety standards:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none">• Bicycles (pedal) : mandatory standard for pedal bicycles based on the Australian and New Zealand Standard AS/NZS 1927:1998. Please see More information• Portable swimming pools : Consumer Goods (Portable Swimming Pools) Safety Standard 2013 sets out the mandatory requirements for portable swimming pools. More information

13. Other Products

Specific requirements for AU

- Small high-powered magnets:
Magnets of a certain size marketed for uses such as toys, games, kits or jewellery are prohibited

14. BREXIT : Electrical Equipment and Environmental Regulations

In the UK, electrical equipment must comply with some specific environmental regulations:

- Batteries, when being placed on the market, must be manufactured appropriately and labelled correctly. Please see the [guidance](#)
- Eco-design, of energy related products, which must meet generic or specific measures relating to their use of energy. Please see the [guidance](#)
- Energy information, must be clear and consistent on energy-consuming products. Please see the [guidance](#)
- RoHS, which regulates the allowable limits of certain hazardous substances and chemicals in electrical and electronic equipment (EEE). Please see the [guidance](#)

15. BREXIT : Requirements for placing goods in the UK

The **UKCA (UK Conformity Assessed)** marking is a new UK product marking that will be used for goods being placed on the market in Great Britain.

It covers most goods which previously required the CE marking. From 1 January 2023, the **UKCA marking** must be affixed directly to the product.
